


# Q2 Are you a member-owner?


# Q3 Number of people in your household




# Q4 About how often do you shop at the Co-op?











Dear Coop, I attended, briefly, the last open session (the emergency meeting). I left after less than 30 minutes because what I heard said was, effectively, "the same old song" that I've heard (on and off) for the last thirteen years (as long as we've been in this state). I will start with the most basic premise that I can put forth: there is no way that any business can operate, or operate well, unless it is actually run as a business. One of the most immutable precepts with respect to running a business is this: you cannot outspend your income. You can't. The Plainfield Coop has been in and out of crises perpetually ever since I have ever set foot in that building. The staff is perpetually underpaid. It is generally not possible to work in the Coop (as a full-time job) and get paid wages that put one above the poverty line. During the last meeting (referenced above), what I heard was that "much-needed raises" were given. I do not know whether or not this was to management, the so-called "low end worker bees", or both, but I did hear that this last round of pay increases (an admirable attempt at trying to make every worker's lives a little better) was the cause of the latest debt crisis. Well, from a business perspective, that completely sucks. That is a non-operational way to sustain any business. I also heard (prior to my bailing out) that there were what I will call the usual suspects called out with respect to making additional income for the Coop - gift cards, calls for more/better/any marketing, etc. etc. I applaud any and all ideas geared towards improving the situation for the Coop. But the one fact that seems to ring loud and clear over and over again is that the Coop perpetually outspends the Coop's income. This is followed by a lot of arm- and handwaving, calls for reform, ideas put forth for additional income generation, cries of alarm that the Coop might have to cut back on its hours or even close, etc. etc. Somewhere along the way a lot of earnest and good people run around and somehow come up with enough money, energy, time, volunteers, etc. to keep the Coop open. As they say, "this is no way to run an airline". And the Coop may not be an airline, but guess what: it's not a going concern as a business either. NO, I would not like to see the Coop close, or sold. But I can guarantee you that there are people who, if handed the reins to run the place from soup to nuts, would revamp the entire organizational structure and would find a way to make the Coop profitable. As far as I can ascertain, the Coop is seriously management-heavy. That's a huge problem - if true - and while it may be great on the one hand to pay (for lack of a better term) "salaries of significance" to those fortunate enough to have them, if the management infrastructure is overbuilt then that is a serious and major contributor to the P&L problems that the Coop perpetually (seemingly) faces. The harsh reality is that due to any number of factors, it may not be possible for ANYONE - or perhaps just a fortunate few - to make enough money working at the Coop full-time to be considered to me "making a living wage". It may simply be that the current model just doesn't support that. It may be that the Coop will have to survive by hiring smart young people who are willing to work for what would generally be considered a substandard wage, have them work for a few years, and then move onto betterpaying jobs. Their positions would have to be back-filled by a similar employee type (young, smart, available, willing to work for less for a while). While that sucks from the perspective of not creating a sustainable employee culture, it sure makes more sense than paying too many employees particularly in management positions - enough money to make the Coop unsustainable as as business. And the one thing that I can state with surety is that if the Coop goes under (and actually closes), nobody will be getting paid there anymore. My suspicion is that those in management who are being paid what passes for a reasonable or workable wage are (understandably) not interested in undergoing a top-to-bottom reorganization, with the accompanying restructuring and concomitant loss of management jobs. I get that. Were I one of the members of management, I would feel the same way. On the other hand, it is hard for me - as a paying customer - to really wish to put a lot of energy, time, money and other resources into a perpetually struggling enterprise that, from all appearances, is unwilling to look very directly and harshly at its inner workings and make some tough, tough choices - based on sound business practices. I hope I'm wrong.
